1. HOW DID YOU HEAR ABOUT AMAZING FUTURES?

> My Mum spoke to Sue around the time the idea for a young people's project was mentioned. I joined Amazing Futures when it started in March 2017.

#### 2. HOW HAVE YOU FOUND VOLUNTEERING FOR AMAZING FUTURES?

It has been really interesting to work with lots of young people over the years. I like setting up for the board games group. I have been going to the running group for a year now and have been going to the walking one for about a year. I enjoy going to all of them.

# YOUNG **PEOPLE'S** VISIT TO THE BOOTH

In January Amazing Futures Brighton & Hove was invited to the Booth Museum of Natural History. The focus of the visit was to share feedback about the current exhibitions and suggest ideas about what could be added.

It was fascinating to see a vast amount of animals whilst learning about the history of the museum: it was founded by Edward Thomas Booth in 1874. He was a naturalist and collector with a keen interest in birds. He created over 300 Victorian-style dioramas featuring bird species found in Britain. He donated the museum to the city in 1890 under the conditions that none of the bird dioramas would be altered. They have been kept the same and each diorama recreated the natural habitat of each given bird.



There is an array of taxidermied animals, fossils, minerals, bones, and microscopic slides; I like that the collection continues to grow. Some of my favourite parts are the platypus near the entrance door and the emperor butterfly, an example of the roughly 700 000 insects in the museum.

Overall, the visit was a fantastic experience for the young people to be a part of generating new ideas for the future so that the Booth Museum continues to be an interesting place to explore, learn and have fun.



## PAGANE VISITS: Team Domenica



I recently visited Team Domenica and delivered a presentation about my work at Amaze. I visited two groups of young people during their enrichment sessions and spoke about what Amaze does and offers.

This was an excellent opportunity to answer questions about what Amazing Futures is like and how one can get involved. The peer support project is youth-led so it is always great to hear new ideas about activities.

I enjoyed meeting the attendees and learning more about what Team Domenica's vision: it is a social enterprise charity for young people with learning disabilities who are encouraged to reach their full potential. It is an inclusive space to learn the skills and confidence needed for paid employment. The project is creating a future with more inclusive and empowering workplaces.

Hello everyone, on Saturday the 4th of February we visited Drusillas wildlife park. We saw many animals not native to the UK, including squirrel monkeys, one of which we adopted ourselves, and the animal I'll be writing for today, the Six-Banded Armadillo!

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Armadillos, like the six-banded variant, live in dry arid regions like in South America. They have relatives in the giant anteater and the sloth and they all use their claws for different purposes, armadillos use their shovel like paws to dig burrows, sloths grab on to trees to climb and anteaters can dig for termites and even use them as effective defensive tools against even Jaguars!

Armadillos have a diet of insects, small vertebrates, plants, some fruits and even an occasional carrion.





And 2.5 millions of years ago, armadillos had a massive relative in the Glyptodon, a mammal that measured 10ft in length, nearly 5ft in height and weighing 2 tons. Like modern armadillo, the glyptodon was covered in a huge carapace that could ward off attackers from many directions, yet that couldn't save it from being hunted by early man and going extinct around 11,000 years ago.
